Clare's pandemic time has included getting married over Zoom, learning to appreciate weeding, and teaching herself how to nap.

Paul D'Arcy is in demand nationally as a soloist and chamber musician. Recent solo appearances include Handel's Messiah and Mozart's Requiem with the Austin Symphony, as well as Mendelssohn's Elijah, Bach's Christmas Oratorio, and Mozart Requiem Undead. Concert work in NYC includes Musica Sacra, St. John the Divine, Trinity Wall Street, Musica Viva, American Classical Orchestra, and Orchestra of St. Luke's. National ensembles include Seraphic Fire, San Diego Bach Collegium, True Concord, Ensemble Origo, and Spire. Discography includes Harmonia Mundi, Reference, Naxos, and PBS, including Conspirare's 2015 Grammy winning CD. Paul also enjoys making barrel-aged cocktails, cooking, and traveling.

Tenor Erik Gustafson is nationally active as an oratorio soloist and choral artist, and teaches voice at Fort Lewis College in Durango, CO. Erik has collaborated on two GRAMMY® Award-winning recordings with the Phoenix Chorale, and albums with Bach Collegium San Diego, Conspirare, True Concord, Spire Chamber Ensemble, and Sounding Light. He performs regularly with Seraphic Fire and Santa Fe Desert Chorale, and is a founder of Quadrivium. Past solo highlights include Bach's St. John Passion with Arizona Bach Festival, Handel's Messiah with Tucson Symphony Orchestra, and Bach's Christmas Oratorio with Oregon Bach Festival. Erik is a connoisseur of craft beer.

Nathan Hodgson is a New York based tenor specializing in early music, chamber music, and choral singing. He sings with the Schola Cantorum at The Church of Saint Vincent Ferrer in New York City and performs with ensembles across the nation. A native of DFW, Nathan studied at the University of North Texas and, after receiving a Bachelor of Music in Music Education, sang regularly in the Dallas area with ensembles including the Orpheus Chamber Singers, Dallas Bach Society, and Denton Bach Society before moving to New York City in 2015. Nathan's extramusical pursuits include baking, hiking, and kickboxing.

Robbie Jacobs studied Music at King's College Cambridge, where he was the Senior Choral Scholar under Stephen Cleobury, and holds a Master's in Choral Conducting from the Royal Academy of Music. He has sung with Tenebrae, The Sixteen, and The Chapel Royal of St. Peter ad Vincula at the Tower of London. As a conductor, he is the Co-Artistic Director of Reverie Choir, was the Acting Artistic Director of the London Youth Choir, has worked extensively with the National Youth Choir of Great Britain, and was the inaugural Conducting Scholar for Genesis Sixteen, under Harry Christophers and Eamonn Dougan. He is currently Director of Artistic Programming for the Boston Children's Chorus.

Nathan Halbur, baritone, performs in solo and choral capacities throughout Boston and its environs. In addition to singing with Cantata Singers since September 2019, he has worked with ensembles including Emmanuel Music and the Metropolitan Chorale (with whom he is Artist in Residence) and has appeared with the Boston Pops in their Holiday Pops Tour. Before moving to New England, he lived in California, acting as Musical Director of the Davis Chamber Choir and studying Physics at the University of California, Davis. He is Artistic Director of Causeway Chamber Soloists (an organization dedicated to producing recitals and recordings of vocal chamber music) and is an active composer and arranger of vocal music. He is half of the jazz/neo-soul duo Dreamglow as vocalist, keyboardist, and producer.

Michael Hawes is a Bass-Baritone Singer and Trumpeter living in Chicago. Music Director of St. Cornelius Church, he is also a member of Axiom Brass, an award winning Brass Quintet that tours the world. Michael sings with the Clarion Choir, Seraphic Fire, and is so honored and excited to join ranks with Skylark this season. Recent performances have taken him to Taiwan, Russia, the Dominican Republic, France, England, Canada and across the United States. Baritone David Tinervia has performed as a soloist throughout the United States and Canada. A two-season fellow of the Tanglewood Music Center, Mr. Tinervia recently made his Tanglewood debut as The Traveler in Curlew River in collaboration with the Mark Morris Dance Group. In January, he was a finalist of the 2016 New England Regional Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions. Composer Gregory W. Brown's music has been heard on American Public Media's Performance Today, BBC Radio, Minnesota Public Radio, Kansas Public Radio, and Danish National Radio; his Missa Charles Darwin received its European debut in March 2013 at the Dinosaur Hall of Berlin's Museum für Naturkunde. Brown's works have been performed across the United States and Europe — most notably at Cadogan Hall in London, the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam, and Carnegie Hall in New York City. His latest major work — Fall & Decline — was released on Navona Records in 2021.



Dan Brown is the author of numerous #1 bestselling novels, including *The Da Vinci Code*, which has become one of the best selling novels of all time as well as the subject of intellectual debate among readers and scholars. Brown's novels are published in 56 languages around the world with over 200 million copies in print. The son of a mathematics teacher and a church organist, Brown was raised on a prep school campus where he developed a fascination with the paradoxical interplay between science and religion. These themes eventually formed the backdrop for his books. He is a graduate of Amherst College and Phillips Exeter Academy, where he later returned to teach English before focusing his attention full time to writing. He lives in New England with his yellow lab, Winston.



Three-time GRAMMY®-nominee Matthew Guard is widely regarded as one of the most innovative and thoughtful programmers in American choral music. Praised for his "catalyzing leadership" (Q2/WQXR) and "musically creative and intellectually rich" programming (Opera Obsession), Matthew is passionate about communicating something unique in each concert and recording. He scours the world of available repertoire for each program, exhaustively researches each piece, and crafts concerts and printed programs that captivate audiences with their hidden connections and seamless artistry. Matthew is also an active arranger and editor of scores, and has just completed work on a new edition of Rachmaninoff's All-Night Vigil, which he will premiere with Skylark in June 2022.

Three-time GRAMMY®-nominee Skylark, "the cream of the American crop" (BBC Radio 3), is a premier vocal ensemble of leading American vocal soloists, chamber musicians, and music educators. Skylark's dramatic performances have been described as "gripping" (The Times of London), "exquisite...thrilling" (Gramophone Magazine), and "awe-inspiring" (Boston Music Intelligencer).

Skylark strives to set the standard for innovative and engaging programs that re-define the choral experience for audiences and singers alike. Artistic Director Matthew Guard's well-researched and creative programs have been described as "engrossing" (WQXR New York) and "original, stimulating, and beautiful" (BBC Radio 3). Skylark's most recent three recordings all reached the top 10 of Billboard's Traditional Classical Chart, earning praise for "imaginative" programming (Limelight Australia) and "singing of the highest standard for any area or any repertoire" (Classics Today).

Since its founding in 2011 in Atlanta and Boston, Skylark has branched out to perform its dynamic programs in museums, concert halls, and churches across the United States. Skylark made its international debut in March 2018 at St. John's Smith Square, London, as part of the UK choir Tenebrae's Holy Week Festival. The Times of London declared that Skylark was "the highlight" of the festival that included some of the UK's leading choirs, including The Tallis Scholars, Polyphony, Tenebrae, and the Gabrieli Consort.

A not-for-profit entity with a passion for music education, Skylark performs educational outreach programs with high school and college students across the United States during its concert tours.

In the fall of 2019, Skylark presented the greatest masterwork of a cappella music as it had never been heard before: a performance of the finest professional vocalists in the United States anchored by world-renowned basses joining forces for the first time ever. After what was described by many Skylarks as their most profound concert experience ever, we vowed to re-visit the work again soon. Join us again in June 2022 for an encore performance, this time working from a new edition of the score prepared by Artistic Director Matthew Guard and Skylark Soprano Fotina Naumenko. A portion of the proceeds raised from these concerts will go to support Ukrianian refugees displaced by the current crisis in Europe.
